This is our Iron Age hill fort. It's a Scheduled Monument, so we keep the ramparts free from scrub and trees to stop the roots breaking up archaeology underground. During the Iron Age you would have been able to see the stark chalk beneath the soil. These white fortifications would have been visible for miles.

Storm the hill!

It was a great location for a fort; you would have been able to see any enemies coming up the river and from the surrounding area.

Storm the hill fort – run up to the top as fast as you can!
